Trom the Pastor's Desk

LEARNING TO LOVE A GOOD MYSTERY

You know the question. You hear it asked constantly from a child who has just learned to talk. The question is "why?" Why, why, why? "Why do I have to eat my broccoli," the inquisitive child asked his father. "Because if you eat your broccoli," said his daddy, "You will grow up big and strong so you can refuse to eat it, like me!"

We are born with an inquisitive nature-wanting to learn and grow and understand. I thank God for that attribute. But our inquisitive nature can be a frustrating attribute, especially when answers to our questions in life are difficult to come by, or worse yet, impossble to find.

Summer is a great time to pick up and read that mystery that you have been putting off for a while. Am I speaking of a novel by Christie, Doyle, Sayers or Hammett? While all great mystery authors, I was thinking of another mystery. Have you ever read the book of Job? It has always been my favorite book in the Old Testament. Job, a righteous and upright man, had everything going for him - a beautiful family; a successful business. In fact, he was described as "the greatest man among all the people of the East." And on top of all his success, he was a humble servant of God. One day that all came to a crashing (and crushing) halt: Satan was given the freedom to take away all that was around him, including his children, as a test to see if Job would remain faithful to the Lord. And then in the remaining chapters we see a person, in the midst of suffering, asking and being asked that question, "Why?" Why has this happened? Job's friends were so sure Job did something terrible to deserve what seemed to be sure punishment from God.

I'm sure you know the rest of the story. After the search for answers, Job finally asks for a hearing with God, a time when Job can probe the mind of God and find out why he has had to suffer so. And the answer from the Lord is: "It is not for you to know." There are some things too lofty and great for our finite minds to comprehend. Job finally humbles himself and calls out to God, saying, "I know that you can do all things; no plan of yours can be thwarted. ³ You asked, 'Who is this that obscures my counsel without knowledge?' Surely, I spoke of things I did not understand, things too wonderful for me to know. ⁴ "You said, 'Listen now, and I will speak; I will question you, and you shall answer me.' ⁵ My ears had heard of you but now my eyes have seen you. ⁶ Therefore I despise myself and repent in dust and ashes." (Job 42:2-6, NIV).

There are so many things in life that we do not understand. I think the only fault of Job in this book is that he <u>demanded</u> to know why he was suffering. He darkens the counsel of the Lord by trying to justify himself by condemning God and God's sense of justice.

Oh, it is not bad to ask the question "why?" It is a good thing to seek the answers to questions in life - as long as we do it humbly, revering the One who has all knowledge. But we need to realize that there are some questions in life - indeed, *Continue next page...*

many questions in life - that will never be answered. God is incomprehensible - meaning that we cannot know all there is to know about our Heavenly Maker. We know only what the Lord chooses to reveal to us. That means that there are events in our lives that may leave us scratching our heads. And when we find ourselves asking for understanding and not finding the answers - that is where our faith kicks in. We simply must say, "God, teach me what you want me to know and I'll trust You with all that remains a mystery."

Why do things happen the way they do? I don't know - but I do know the one who holds all the answers, even the ones that will always remain a mystery to us in this life. And I choose to trust God even when life doesn't make sense. I hope you too have decided to trust the Lord in all things. In his devotion on the Psalms entitled In the Lord I Take Refuge, Dane Ortlund writes, "Puritan John Bunyan wrote, 'I have often seen, that the afflicted are always the best sort of Christians.' He goes on to explain that what we see as good providences (health, success, ease) frequently have minimal spiritual value, while what we see as bad providences (pain, trial, darkness) are often our deepest sources of spiritual nourishment and growth" (devotion on Psalm 84). The book of Job bears out this very point.

I will leave you with an inspirational poem by William Coltman:

Until I learned to trust, I never learned to pray; And I did not learn to fully trust, till sorrow came my way. Until I felt my weakness, His strength I never knew; Nor dreamed 'til I was stricken, that He could see me through. (...continues in textbox to the right ...)

MISSIONARY UPDATE: ELISHA AND CRYSTAL STOCK

Serving in East Africa, the following is a statement of commitment by Elisha and Crystal: "We have a heart to reach the unreached in East Africa. Our passion is to use aviation to take the Gospel to those who have never heard. The airplane is a tool we use in order to support missionaries and pastors serving in remote areas of Congo, South Sudan, Central African Republic, Kenya, and Uganda. Whether we fly people, medicine, Bibles, or food, our desire is to serve in order to further the Gospel."

Elisha has recently completed his training to fly the Cessna Caravan which is a larger aircraft that AIM AIR flies. Up to this point he has been flying the Cessna 206, a smaller plane that carries 5 passengers. The Caravan holds 13 passengers or about 1 ton of cargo. It is a great aircraft for East Africa with its rugged construction and large capacity.

Partnering with Samaritans Purse, Elisha was able to spend a week in South Sudan, flying cleft lip patients from remote villages into the capital, so that a team of Doctors from around the world could come and perform surgery on them. By the end of the week, the team was able to perform 89 cleft lip surgeries! It was such a blessing to be a part of this trip and to see the joy on peoples faces as they went back home looking more normal than before.

Crystal made a short 3-week trip back to the US this month. Her sister was undergoing surgery that had potential to be extensive. Crystal had a great time with her sister and was able to care for her and her 2-year old during surgery and through recovery. Please continue to pray for the Stocks as they serve God in East Africa.
